Dear Mr. Smith:

On February 3, 1989, Andrea Wilson met with you in prearbitration discussion of the enclosed list of grievances.

The issue in these grievances is whether the U.S. Postal Service violated the USPS/NRLCA Agreement when establishing directs in rural delivery with no minimum number pieces.

During the discussion, it was mutually agreed that the following would represent full and complete settlement of these cases:

When considering implementation or expansion of a directs program, all distribution functions should be carefully reviewed. Potential directs may exist in city, rural and post office box distribution. Directs with the greatest potential savings should be selected first. Directs should normally be reviewed periodically to ensure compliance with this policy.

Additionally, a review of the enclosed list of grievances regarding directs must be made and adjustments made where necessary to comply with this guideline.

Dear Mr. Smith:

On September 28, 1987, we met to discuss the above-captioned grievance at the fourth step of our contractual grievance procedure.

The issue in this grievance is whether the U.S. Postal Service violated the USPS/NRLCA 1984 National Agreement when establishing directs with no minimum number of pieces in rural delivery.

The NRLCA contends there has been a change in established practices, policy and procedure regarding the minimum number of pieces required to establish a direct in rural delivery.

It is the Postal Services' position that no national interpretive issue involving the terms and conditions of the National Agreement is fairly presented in this case. However, inasmuch as the Union did not agree, the following represents the decision of the Postal Service on the particular fact circumstances involved.

Section 225.4 of the Methods Handbook, M-37, does not require a minimum number of pieces to be contained in a direct and the Handbook provisions have not been changed. Accordingly, there has not been a violation of the Agreement and the grievance is denied.
